RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND:

This report is prepared and provided for the Parks and Recreation Commission for review and information on the current status of the maintenance and operations of the City of Walnut's Park system.

The Maintenance Division of the Community Services Department manages general park maintenance at all City parks. General maintenance is performed largely by a landscape maintenance contractor and some by the City staff. The general maintenance includes mowing, edging, hedging, pruning of shrubs and trees, as well as the monitoring of rodents and pests. It also includes irrigation audits and playground inspections. Restroom maintenance services are provided by the custodial contractor. Park restrooms are open and maintained seven days a week, with the exception of two holidays per year (Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day).

City parks with sports fields are maintained at an optimum level through the services of sports field specialists. City staff augments the maintenance services through regular inspections and audits of the fields.

City maintenance staff also performs special projects in all parks including graffiti removal and playground equipment repairs. In order to conform to California playground standards, staff performs playground inspections on a weekly basis.

SENIOR PROGRAMS:

SENIOR DINE-IN NUTRITION LUNCH PROGRAM

The Senior Dine-In Nutrition program is open to seniors 60 years and older. Since the start of May, we are now serving hot meals Monday through Friday, on a first-come first-serve basis. To participate in this program guests must complete a YWCA intake form, check-in begins at 10:30 a.m. with meals served from 11:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. or until food is available. Average attendance: 50+

SOCIAL CONNECTIONS:

The City of Walnut Senior Center is partnering with Vanessa Valenzuela, Community Liaison Public Health Nurse with the Los Angeles County of Public Health Department, on Tuesdays from 11:30 am to 1:30 pm to offer a two hour support group for seniors allowing individuals to come together around a common activity to develop social connections. Here seniors are able to come and socialize, play games, share their stories, and explore different topics with Vanessa and their fellow peers. Average attendance: 8-10

OLDER ADULT CLASSES:

OLDER ADULT CLASSES

Heart and Soul Line Dance classes started offering lessons twice a week. Monday classes are perfect for the working older adult and scheduled for 6pm. Thursday classes are perfect for the retired person, scheduled for the morning at 9:30 am. These classes are a perfect way to good heart health without the constant strain on joints and easy to follow. All levels are welcome and no partner is necessary.

Zumba Gold classes are now being offered at the Senior Center on Mondays from 12:30 pm to 1:30 pm. Zumba Gold is a lower impact dace class designed with seniors in mind. This fun and social class will teach different types of Latin and international dances. This class provides simple to follow Zumba choreography that promotes balance, range of motion, posture strengthening and coordination.

GROW GROUP COUNSELING

The Senior Group GROW Group Counseling program has continued to be in person, since the transition of the virtual forum. GROW meets the first Friday of every month from 9:00 am to 11:00 am. Participants ages 55 and older are welcome and encouraged to learn new skills that will allow them to GROW.

TEEN CENTER:

The Teen Center Summer hours are now open starting June 5 to August 4. Fees are \$75 per teen. Teen Center summer hours will be Monday through Thursday from 12:30 pm to 6:00 pm. Teens in 6th through 12th grades enjoy activities including sports, crafts, board games, movies, air hockey, table tennis, foosball and pool. In July, staff started preparing for the upcoming school-year and bringing back Teen Friday Nights (TFN's). Teen Center membership for the school-year will be \$120 for the year or \$75 for each semester.

Youth and Family Group Counseling

This program is conducted every Monday at 6:00 pm at the Walnut Senior Center.

SUMMER CAMPS AND AQUATICS:

Camp Movin' n' Groovin' (CMG) CMG opened it's 10-week program on June

Camp Movin' n' Groovin (CMG) is back this summer to host ten weeks of fun programming. This camp is appropriate for youth ages 7 to 14 years. It includes an assortment of activities designed to get children "moving" as well as crafts, trips and snacks. In the month of June and July CMG was completely sold out with 40 campers each week. Parents can choose to have their children participate in Movin' All Day from 7:00 am to 6:00 pm for \$200 a week or In the Grove from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm for \$150 a week. Each session includes themed weeks such as; Endless Summer, Star Spangled Fun, Camps Got Talent and Adios Summer and field trips on Wednesdays. Some of trips that campers went to were: Raging Waters, Medieval Times, Huntington Beach, Wild Rivers and California Science Center.

Camp Crawdad - June

Camp Crawdad has returned back to its traditional scheduling of being located at two parks, Suzanne Park and Lemon Creek Park. This summer we hosted two, four-week sessions. A nominal registration fee of \$100 per participant is required to assist with the cost of the program. The registration fee covers a camp T-shirt and one session (four weeks) of fun activities from sports, games and crafts. Camp Crawdad meets Monday through Thursday from 9:00 am to 11:30 am at Lemon Creek Park (Mondays & Wednesdays) and Suzanne Park (Tuesdays and Thursdays).

Registration is ongoing. The first session of Camp Crawdad began on Monday, June 5 and had a total of 103 registered participants.

On Wednesday, June 28, Camp Crawdad attended its first excursion since the pandemic to Medieval Times in Buena Park. Camp excursions are limited spacing and are an additional fee. This trip was sold out at 40 participants.

On Thursday, June 29, Camp Crawdad held it's End of Session Potluck and celebrated the end of the first session with pizza, snacks, fruit and a dessert.

Camp Crawdad - July

On July 3, Camp Crawdad began their second session with a sold out crowd of 110 campers.

Camp Olympics has returned and the friendly rivalry between Camp Crawdad and Camp Movin' & Groovin' has reignited. During the week of July 24, Crawdad and Movin' & Groovin' enter into a series of competitive events that test the knowledge, creativity, athleticism and spirit of both camps. Medals are awarded for each event and the grand trophy is given to the winner of the ever popular camp obstacle course. It was a very close match between both camps, however, the winner was...Camp Movin' & Groovin'!

On Wednesday, July 26, Camp Crawdad went on its 2nd excursion of the summer to the California Science Center in Los Angeles. Camp excursions are limited spacing and are an additional fee. This trip was sold out at 40 participants.

On Thursday, July 27, Camp Crawdad held it's End of Session BBQ and celebrated the end of the summer with hamburgers, hot dogs, snacks, fruit and a dessert.

AQUATICS

The Walnut Valley Unified School District allocated time at the Walnut High School pool this summer. While this time is truncated from prior years, it most importantly permits the City to offer Tiny Tots, all swim levels (1-5), adaptive lessons and adult lap swim. Current staffing levels also work well with the allotted time. Group and adaptive swim classes began May 30 as well with classes starting at 9:15 am and running approximately 30 minutes throughout the morning concluding by 1:00 pm. The Aquatics program will run for 10 weeks and will also have lap swim for adults.

The Recreation Division Sharks Swim Team for the summer began practices May 30 practices are held Monday through Friday from 7:00 am to 9:00 am. The Sharks Swim team competed in the SCMAF San Gabriel Valley Swim Meet on July 23 in the City of Rosemead were they competed against swim teams from all over the San Gabriel Valley. Those who participated in that meet were eligible to swim at the SCMAF Championships that will be held on August 12 in Santa Clarita. We had 29 of the 51 Sharks Swim team represent the City at both of these meets. The Sharks also participated in a dual meet against the Covina Blue Rays on July 13 and a quad meet with Covina, Irwindale and Duarte teams on August 5.

SPORTS LEAGUES & CLASSES:

Open Gym hours for Table Tennis, Badminton, and Basketball are available in the morning from 8:30 am to 1:30 pm at the Walnut Gymnasium and volleyball on Tuesdays from 7:00 pm to 10:30 pm.

Uptempo Basketball Academy held the remaining two of their three camps in June and July. The first camp, held June 12 – 15 camp hosted 38 participants. The second camp was held July 10 - 13 and hosted 56 participants. They will be hosting their last camp August 7 -10. The camp ran from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm and participants were engaged in multiple skill learning drills and scrimmage games on a daily basis.

Walnut Youth Basketball (WYB)

Registration for the summer league will began May, with practices beginning the week of June 5. The Summer WYB season will be a six-week coed league with 22 teams for children in grades K through 8th. Games began on July 1 and will run through August 5.

The Adult Basketball League (ABL)

The Summer ABL for Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday League bean in June with a total of 54 teams playing those days. New this year we added a 35 and older Division on Thursday night and have 4 teams participating.

Fourth of July Celebration

The City of Walnut's Fourth of July Celebration was held on Tuesday, July 4, at Suzanne Park from 5:00 pm to 9:30 pm. This year's turnout was outstanding, with over 6,000 guests. The event features included; the Patriotic Pooch Parade, game booths, food trucks, live entertainment by the band, Blue Breeze Band, and a spectacular firework show.

Music and Movies in the Park

The Music and Movies in the Park series began on Tuesday, July 11 and continued every Tuesday in the month through National Night Out, August 1. RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Commission:

- 1. Conduct an open discussion regarding potential locations in Walnut for a dog park.
- 2. Receive and file this report.

BACKGROUND:

At the August 9, 2023 City Council Meeting, Mayor Pro Tem, Linda Freedman requested that the Parks and Recreation Commission revisit the topic of a dog park and discuss the feasibility constructing one in Walnut.

The Commission has considered dog park development in past years, most recently in October 2022 and January 2020. The Commission has supported the idea, even including it as a proposed amenity in the Walnut Ranch Park Expansion Environmental Impact Report.

To proceed with further discussion of this topic, the Commission is requested to start exploring potential repurposing of existing park locations.

ANALYSIS:

The ideal park location would:

- 1. Be at least one acre of more in size.
- 2. Be surrounded by a 4'-6' fence and gated (divided for large and small dogs),
- 3. Provide adequate shade and water for people and dogs,
- 4. Provide seating for pet owners,

- 5. Have set hours of operation,
- 6. Have ample parking,
- 7. Contain pet waste bag dispensers (bags supplied by City) and pet waste collection stations,
- 8. Be accessible per ADA regulations, and
- 9. Have low-level security lighting at night for security purposes.

One of the bigger issues with dog parks is location, both in terms of neighborhood compatibility and the fit with other park uses. First, the best locations are not adjacent to residential areas due to vehicular traffic, spillover parking, and the noise associated with a dog park.

In addition, since there are not a large number of dog parks, they tend to attract users from surrounding communities. As such, parking is of paramount importance and should be considered when identifying a potential location.

Staff would like to discuss any new or creative ideas to help identify a potential location for a future dog park in Walnut. This may include alternate locations or the repurposing of an existing use or amenity. It is important to note that the response to and impact on the neighboring community and all residents should be considered during this discussion.
